

The difference with England and the rest of the World, were that England was there on a shoestring budget, the other Countries were there with help from their Governments, Sport Councils & Sponsorships from Large Companies. Taking Money aside England did very well. All our senior women made the semi-finals for the first time. Our Senior pairs made the final and finished 5th. The team made the finals and finished 6th & our Junior Women finished in the top 20, a great achievement as this would have been their first World Championships. All our athletes have to finance themselves for the trips abroad, in other words they pay for the privilege of representing

SAPPHIRE BATONETTES

The Sapphire Batonettes, are situated in Sheerness, on the Isle of Sheppey, which is in Kent. They were formed from a Breakaway Troupe, in 1985, in the early years; the troupe consisted of about 40 athletes, But as the years passed a number of their members left and the troupe went down to just 4 members, however, when the BBTSA registration time came, the troupe scrapped through with the minimum number of athletes to register. The troupe membership returned to about 20 athletes, and in the past 5 years the troupe have go up to 30 athletes at one stage. The Sapphire Batonettes, have been associated with the BBTSA since their origins, and have attended the Nationals Championships at Portsmouth, and the highest that the troupe members have reached is 3rd place. This year they will be attending the National Championships in Portsmouth, and hopefully will reach higher placing's, with the eleven athletes that are attending

MERCURY BATON TWIRLERS.

As we are quite new members of the BBTSA, we thought you may like to know something about our corps. Mercury Twirlers were formed in November 1985, by trainer Rachel EMMS, and her mother, Rose SWAINE. Rachel has been a twirler since childhood, and represented England many times whilst a member of the NBTA. She also twirled as a member of a troupe called ' Studio One 'as a member of the BBTSA before forming Mercury Twirlers. Although Mercury are quite new to BBTSA twirling, many of the members have been twirling since they were tiny. Some of the girls were lucky enough to go to the USA in 1993, to watch and compete in an open competition. They all did very well, and came home with lots of prizes, including First and Second. In 1995 Mercury joined forces with First Impressions to form a colour guard squad to compete in the NBTA World Championships in Italy. After lots of hard work by all of the girls, trainers, and parents, we are proud to say that we won. Several of our girls competed in the England Squad for the NBTA including Nicola SWAINE, who was European Champion Three Times. Another athlete Annika RIVERS has been placed 7 h Nicola was lucky enough to be selected as a reserve for the 1998 BBTSA England Team and enjoyed the recent championships at Portsmouth. Since joining the BBTSA, our girls have been very impressed with the standard of twirling they see at Competitions, especially at the Nationals at Easter, and those who saw the European Championship Competition, could talk of nothing else for days! They are now working hard to perfect routines for the 1999 Selections as they all want to take part in it!. They are also training hard for the October finals at Great Yarmouth, and looking forward to the week very much. The twirling is very different in BBTSA, when compared with what the girls have been doing, and they have had to work hard to adjust to the new rules and styles. The team routines are all set, and Rose is working hard on new leotards, so hopefully it will all come together, just right when October comes. Although we have only been with the BBTSA a short time, we have been impressed with the things that we have experienced. The competitions have all been well run, and very friendly. We were all extremely pleased to see the video cameras being used at the Nationals to support the judges decisions, something we have not experienced in the past. The monthly meetings that we attend are always informative, and everyone is really helpful, even when they are repeating things for the umpteenth time for Rose's benefit! We are all looking forward to a long and happy, and hopefully successful, relationship with the BBTSA.

their Country. Their Families have to sacrifice a great deal not only for the trips to the major championships but also for the cost of training, this involves the hire of sports halls, the cost of coaches and trainers. This takes place week in week out, for many hours per week, especially as athletes and coaches often live miles from each other. The European Championships took place in July in Portsmouth, England, our athletes performed brilliantly in front of their home audience. For the first time in 14 years we had a male athlete taking part, Kurt Bailey from Norfolk, who finished in the top 3 of the junior men. The group consisted of 11 members finished a brilliant 3rd. We also had junior and senior women in the top 15. With senior pairs in 4th place and the team in 5th place. The BBTSA is the only association recognised by both the European and World Governing Bodies, but within England there are many other smaller associations, like other sports these associations are often localised or are often Majorette orientated. Baton twirling first evolved from Majoretting but then developed into a sport to incorporated both dance and gymnastics, which takes years to perfect. We now have our athletes staying longer within the sport, instead of retiring in their mid teens they are now staying on into their twenties, incorporating university or careers with their sport. It's when you see these top senior teams performing, you realise the years of hard work that have been dedicated to achieving such an ability. I believe that it's about time that people stop sneering at minority sports such as Baton Twirling and start applauding these athletes for doing well, not only for themselves but also their Country in the European and World Championships.

Twirling will still carry on with families making sacrifices for their children to realise their potential, some financing would go a long way to make things easier. Spain is hosting the Europeans in 1999, with the Worlds being hosted in America. Yes England will be represented, but with either a

Now don't delay.


THE NETHERHALL TWIRLERS
